
A Word from Lady Melody Garber

From the Editor's Archives

It's fitting, as we start the new fraternal year, we celebrate the birth of our Country. During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the American colonies from Great Britain occurred on July 2, 1776, when the Second Continental Congress voted to approve a resolution of independence. After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement explaining this decision, which had been prepared by a Committee of Five, with Thomas Jefferson as its principal author. Congress debated and revised the Declaration, finally approving it on July 4. A day earlier, John Adams had written to his wife Abigail: *The second day of July, 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more.*

Adams' prediction was off by two days. From the outset, Americans celebrated independence on July 4, the date shown on the much-publicized Declaration of Independence, rather than on July 2, the date the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of Congress. The myth that Congress signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776 had become so firmly established that, decades after the event and nearing the end of their lives, even the elderly Thomas Jefferson and John Adams had come to believe that they and the other delegates had signed the Declaration on the fourth. Most delegates actually signed the Declaration on August 2, 1776. In a remarkable series of coincidences, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, two founding fathers of the United States and the only two men who signed the Declaration of Independence to become president, died on the same day: July 4, 1826, which was the United States' 50th anniversary.

May God Bless and keep safe all the men & women who have fought to keep our Country free.





The U.S. flag stands for our nation and the shared history, pride, principles, and commitment of its people. When we properly display this powerful symbol, we signal our respect for everything it represents.



The flag shouldn't be flown in inclement weather unless it's an all-weather flag.



Flags displayed at night should be properly illuminated.



In a time of national mourning, hang the flag at half-mast.

The flag can be flown every day, but it is often flown to show patriotism on these observances:

When displaying the flag ...



From your porch, place the union (blue section) at the peak of the staff.



Against a wall or on a window, place the union (blue section) at the top left corner.



On your vehicle, clamp the staff to the right front fender.



With another flag, place the U.S. flag to your left when crossed.



Keep your flag completely dry and folded properly — into a triangle, with the union (blue section) visible — before storing it in a well-ventilated area. If the flag is damaged or worn out, it should be disposed of with dignity.



The flag should not touch anything below it or rest on the ground.

Last Standard Bearer

For many years, all Americans took on the duty of flag bearing from childhood. Every family had a flag and felt a duty to fly to on national holidays. Until recently the only serious question about flying the American flag went back to King George. A recent poll said a majority of Americans see the waving of an American flag as divisive and don't feel comfortable having one in their yard.

The flag standard bearer in battle was first used in 1777 in the Battle occurred during a Revolutionary War skirmish at Cooch's Bridge, Delaware. Several patriots died holding the flag against a charge of crack Hessian troops. During the Battle of the Republic, the flag bearer was considered a mark of great distinction and it required a soldier of extraordinary bravery. The army's flag bearers were always the prime target and were in the densest and most violent fighting. Thousands would die in the act of holding the flag. Often it would be the flag bearer that rallied the Union when the fight against slavery was near collapse.

The Irish were first to take the flag in those bloody Civil War battles and hundreds of Irish flag bearers died. Not surprisingly, it would be an Irish American, who in the 1908 started the tradition of never dipping the American flag to other nations at the Olympics in England. The international press considered it blatant nationalism. The debate on dipping the flag continued until Hitler's 1936 Olympics in Berlin. The practice was codified when the American team voted not to dip flag to Hitler's review. The world noted it was not American nationalism that was to be feared but Nazis Germany's national socialism.

During the Spanish-American War, Teddy Roosevelt used the flag and flagbearer to turn the battle of San Juan Hill. With modern warfare, the flag bearer was used less. But the flag remained a rallying point. Thousands more American soldiers gave their lives to merely keep the flag from touching the ground. The rising of the flag during the Battle of Iwo Jima become a rallying point for the nation. A similar image to that of the Raising the Flag Over Iwo-Jima, the World Trade Center photo has become equally as famous on September 11, 2001 with firefighters raising the flag above the rubble. Modern warfare eliminated the need for battlefield flagbearers, but many millions of average Americans took on the tradition as civic duty. By the 1950s, we were a nation of flagbearers.

The question we face today is will there be a last flag bearer. The flag faces the total defeat that it was avoided for years by foreign powers. It is a legend that the American flag will never be taken in war, but this enemy is among us. It is an enemy far tougher the Hessians, the British Black Guard, the German Storm Troopers, the Japanese island defenders, and terrorists of September 11. It is "political correctness" and wokeness that shames us from flying the flag. Only a few decades ago on July 4 every house would fly the flag. Today on the 4th you can drive miles and not see an American flag. Young Americans don't see the flag as a symbol of freedom but one of oppression. People don't want to offend their neighbors by placing a flag out, when only a few decades ago put seem strange not to fly the flag on the 4th.

For centuries, American flag bearers gave their lives just so the flag would not touch the ground. Today, American flags are used as rags. The flag is burned every day on our streets. In instead of a remembrance of those millions that died for it, it is disrespected as a sign for political causes. Christ asked if when returned there would be any believers. Americans might ask if in ael76i generation there will be someone to bear the flag. Has the last flag bearer already been born?


